SA 532: Theoretical Perspectives in Anthropology

Course Objectives

The objective of this course is to inculcate an understanding of anthropological perspectives on human nature, behaviors and practices—i.e., culture in general. It examines the differences and continuities of theoretical approaches over time. The course aims to locate history of anthropology as a discipline by examining the relationship between the modes of knowledge and forms of political-economic dominance. The course aims to provide students with more balanced comparative perspective drawing from the 'classical' and 'contemporary' theoretical perspectives and approaches in anthropology. The course will (a) critically examine selected works (i.e., original writings) of selected scholars who have made substantial contributions to the theoretical discourses in the discipline—with a particular focus on their theoretical assumptions, epistemologies, themes and substantive applications, and (b) orient the students on the major issues, shifts and transformations in anthropology (including Nepal) as a discipline over the time.
